WCSS Executive Director Report

WCSS Highlights:

We celebrated one year in our new building (Whistler Blackcomb Foundation Social Services Centre). Operating all programs out of one location has increased agency efficiency and we were able to expand programming- Finding the Balance Yoga, Community Kitchens and 55+ Drop In. Outreach workers were very busy seeing clients and making referrals. Having private, confidential space to meet has been invaluable. We added a new program this year due to a generous donation- School Lunch Fund in partnership with the elementary school PAC's.

Our food bank saw some major changes in food distribution. Instead of prepacking bags, we have moved to a 'pick your own' system which enables food bank clients to make their own choices about what they need. The shelves are labeled with limits depending on family size vs. individual needs. This change has been well received by staff, volunteers and clients. Savings have been incurred as we are not automatically packing high price items such as peanut butter that not everyone eats. People with health and dietary needs are able to pick the food that will contribute best to their health in a dignified way. Overall, we expect that food waste has gone down and we were able to stretch our donations further as people are actually picking slightly less than what we used to prepack.

The core funding for operating Whistler Community Services Society (WCSS) programs and services is based on practices and strategies that remove household goods and building supplies from the waste stream in Whistler. In 2012 the Re-Use-It Centre & Re Build It Centre kept over 640 metric tonnes from the landfill. The stores sell these donated goods at affordable prices which in turn provides funding for social service programming that benefits Whistler residents.

The addition of collecting bottles at the Re Use It Centre and select satellite locations throughout Whistler is a new addition to our sustainability plan. Ongoing partnerships with the RMOW, other businesses and individuals have contributed to the success of the Re-Use-It and Re-Build-It Centres.

With the support of the WCSS Re-Use-It Centre & Re Build It Centre financially restricted families have access to affordable goods and warm clothes. In our 2012 fiscal year, the stores had \$8832 worth of gift certificates redeemed by financially restricted residents.

I would like to say a sincere thank you to the store and outreach staff, and finance manager that makes WCSS possible as well as board of directors.
